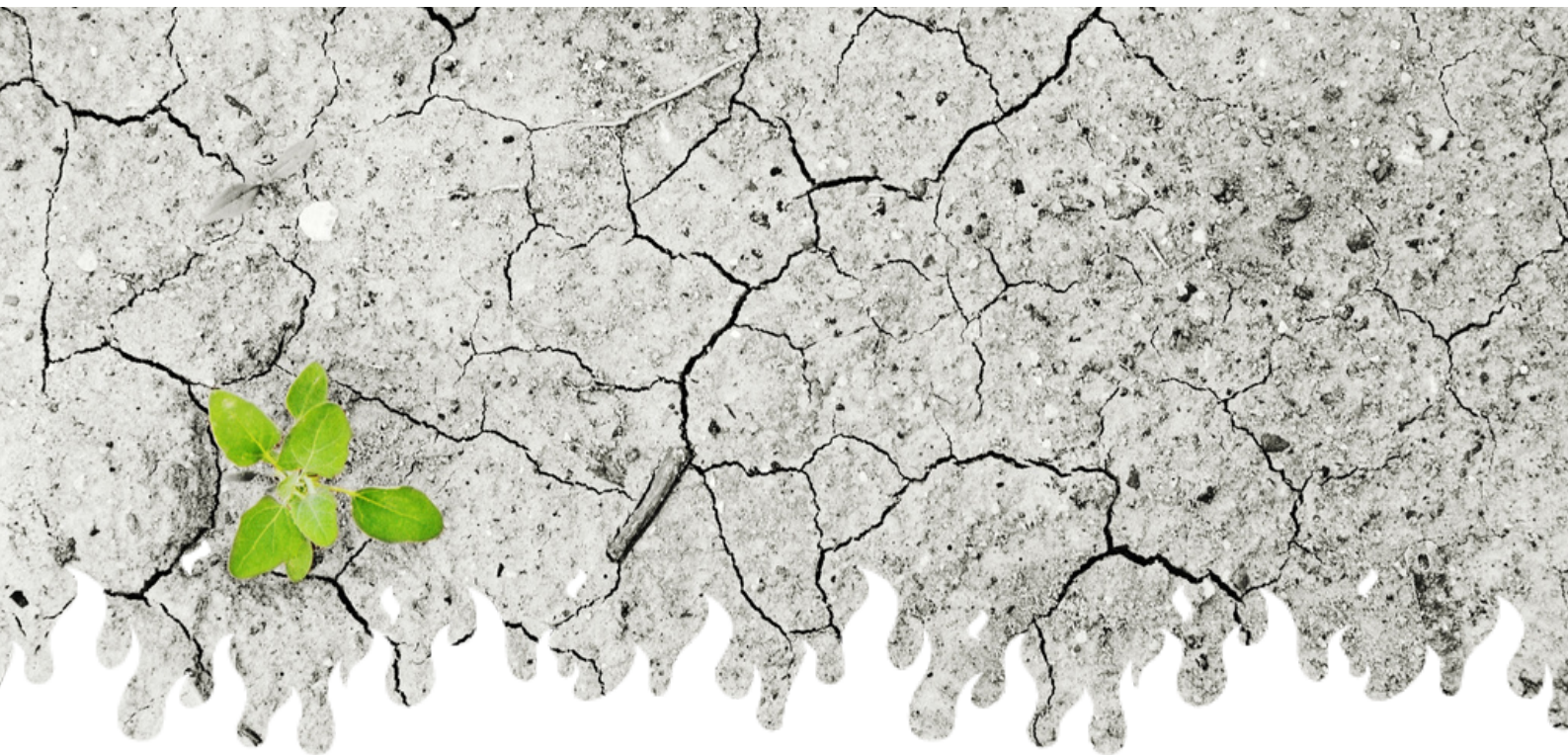




# STOP LIES ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE

During these months all partners applied the SLACC methodology in their respective countries (Slovenia, Germany, Italy, Austria, Bulgaria, Cyprus and France) achieving interesting results.

## How to apply the SLACC methodology in different contexts?

The partners piloted the SLACC methodology in different contexts with different target groups. Each partner organised one or more sessions for young people aged 18-30 in Germany, Austria, Italy, Bulgaria, Cyprus and Slovenia from May to July 2023, involving a total of 152 young people from different backgrounds. Youth workers, students, activists, volunteers, migrants and young people with fewer opportunities were all included in the pilot. The results of this pilot phase will soon be available in full in a free downloadable guide. In the meantime, here are some useful recommendations that the partners have gathered from the people involved:

### Involvement of the participants

- Cooperate with organisations that are continuously working with young people. In this way, it was easier to gather a larger number of young people.
- Knowing the target groups is essential, to better address participants needs.

### Engagement of the participants

- Create an informal atmosphere where the young people will feel free to speak up and share their opinions.
- Avoid a frontal classroom setting, preferring the circle.
- Start the session with an icebreaker, it will help to relax the participants, preparing them for the learning experience.
- Don't forget some short energizer activities, in the middle of the session or after the coffee break, which would be suitable when the concentration drops or when the participants are tired.
- Having small groups will make it easier to create the right atmosphere, in which everyone can have an opportunity to express themselves, being listened carefully.
- Encourage the sharing of experiences and good practices, to better connect with the topic and the rest of the group, creating the space for a healthy debate, allowing the participants to give their preferences without the fear of being judged.

### Methodologies

- Choose the right methodology for your group.
- Think of a plan b, to cope with unexpected situations avoiding frustration. In the case of language barriers it is possible to choose activities that use pictures, body language and that encourage other forms of expression.
- Make a technology check in advance to be prepared!
- Find the right balance between theory and practice.



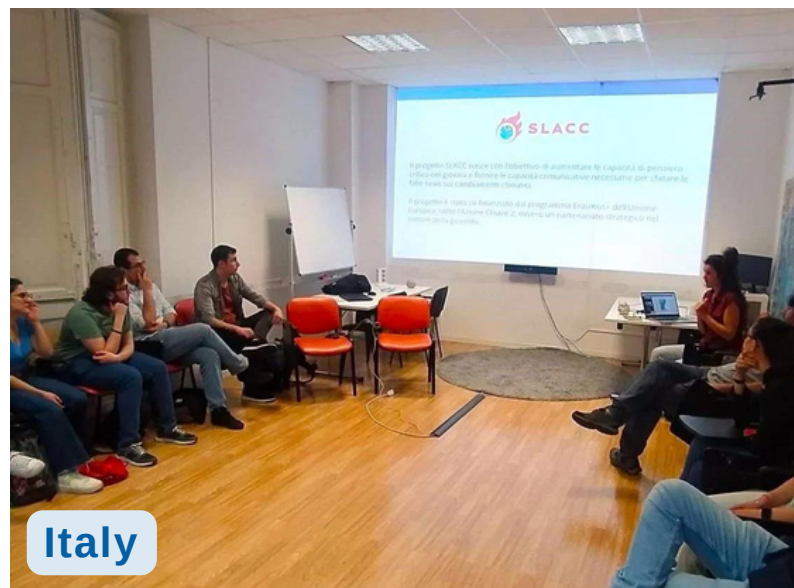

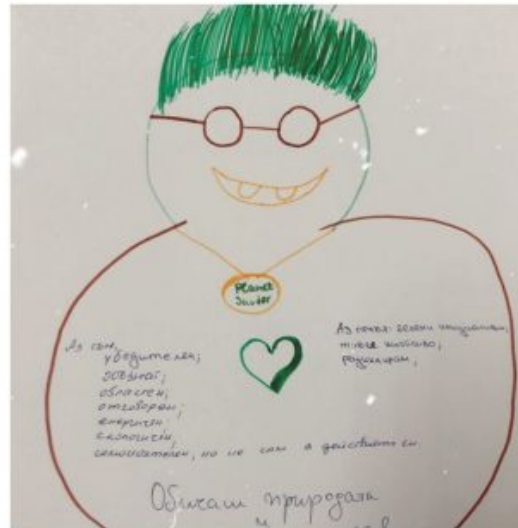
